Battered women to get makeovers

Group hopes to overcome faith divide

The Christ Our Lord Overpowers Religious Separation Foundation, a nonprofit organization that aims to bridge societal and cultural differ-ences through humanitarian programs, will host a fundraiser from 3 to 8 p.m. Jan. 19 for its Be the Miracle mentoring program.

The COLORS foundation hosted a fundraiser Dec. 8 for its Be the Miracle program and will host a second for those who could not attend.

The event will include a makeover, manicure, dinner and a gift bag for battered and re-habilitated women, and will be held in the community room at the Poughkeepsie Galleria, 2001 South Road, Pough-

keepsie. Delsie Howey established the foundation in 2011 to eliminate religious separation and encourage unity among multiple religious and racial groups through active collaboration on community and charita-

ble projects. According According to the group, the foundation is not a religious organization, but instead offers humanitarian programs such as mentoring for bullies, inmates and battered women as well as

support for the homeless and programs to improve self-esteem, develop spir-itual awareness and en-

courage positive thinking. Howey said she be-lieves, "through the power of unconditional love, understanding and re-spect for one's belief, we can remove the barriers of all divisions through our similarities rather than discriminating against our differences."

Howey was born and raised in Brooklyn. She found her passion for helping people at an early

age.
"It was through my

own triumph over my struggle with self-acceptance that led me to start my (nonprofit) organiza-

tion," she said.
"I wanted to give back
to those who live a life in despair. ... And with great fortitude, I was ready to commit to my community

commit to my community and all other communities," she said.

The foundation provides its programs and activities at venues such as the YMCA, churches, shelters for battered vomen and repubilisation. women and rehabilitation

centers.
"Some people conceal their pain and don't seek

help due to society's cynical perception of those who don't meet their expectations of perfection," she explained.
"In result, people develop insecurities and extraggle with self-ac-

struggle with self-ac-ceptance," Howey continued.

"I want to demonstrate acts of love without judgment and help them discover their own truth," Howey said.
