# Book covers local political life

The Poughkeepsie Journal's newest book is available for purchase or pickup, for those who preordered — at the Journal's office.

"Democracy Dutchess: 300 Years of County Political Life" is a pictorial look at how government has influenced life in the mid-Hudson Valley.

The 144-page book

covers the region's history from 1713, when the first organized governstructure formed in Dutchess, to the present. The book is the fifth in a series on history in the mid-Hudson Valley.

Park, Kaal Rock Park, King Street Park and College Hill Park.

"At least at this moment in time, they're clean," said Rich. "Our goal was to clean the parks; they sometimes get in rough shape. And we achieved our goal."

Shapley said about 75 cleanups were held Sat-urday in conjunction with hundreds of local clubs and organizations.

Volunteers with the Poughkeepsie Journal's Greater Good Committee joined Riverkeeper's efforts focusing on Kaal Rock Park, which was free of litter by late morning. The committee promotes community involvement and volunteerism among employees and readers.

Susan Fox Rogers, 52, a Tivoli resident and creative writing professor at Bard College, organized a 15-person cleanup of Tivoli North Bay via canoe and kayak, while Bard students separately cleaned the South Bay using canoes, she said.

Rogers said it's satisfying to do something that has a measurable impact.

"The river belongs to all of us and everyone has to pitch in," she said. "It's one of the most magnificent parts of this coun-

Other Dutchess cleanup events were organized for the Wappinger Creek, the Beacon waterfront, at Mills Norrie State Park in Staatsburg and in Ulster County in Esopus and Kingston, Shapley said.

Past storms left a good deal of trash along the shorelines, when the high tides receded, he said.

"We enjoy our water-fronts because they're beautiful and a nice place to be," he said. "Trash mars that so we want to remove it. It's also emblematic of the issues the river faces: We know from the testing we do, for instance, that the river

isn't always safe to swim (in) because there's still sewage discharged into it at some places and times." Riverkeeper

Sweep is part of a national series of river cleanup events organized by Waterkeeper Alliance, a Riverkeeper helped to found, that fosters the protection of rivers worldwide, he said.

meeting is June 13. Fortis has said it hopes the deal can get the commission's OK and close by the end of June.

The \$1.5 billion deal is strongly advocated by Poughkeepsie-based CH Energy, parent of Central Hudson Gas & Electric Corp., which has campaigned locally to rally some chatter in favor of their plan.

It's not up to the public.

But the public's consistently negative views given during four public statement hearings in February and April were cited in the negative advice given to the commission by its administrative law judges who are overseeing the case.

The debate continues. Thursday, at the annual breakfast of the Dutchess County Economic Development Corp., the group's president, Cathy Maloney, urged guests to support the deal.

Among other features, it includes \$4.5 million for regional economic development initiatives.

Though the commission's record closed after May 1, comments continue to come in.

Mary D. Madden said in her post that she was concerned at first, but studied the deal further and now offers "complete support."
"Under a

purchase agreement, it isn't often that a company will remain a standalone company with local decisionmaking authority and managed by the same leadership team who are known, trusted and are part of our community," she said.

A post from Janet C. Mills said: "This is not a hotel, store or airline business, which clients have the right to choose to patronize. This affects people's daily well being with no alternative choice. Ownership, oversight and control of a national resource needs to be by Americans with American interests, beyond the financial bottom line, in mind."
